I grew up in the south eastern part of South Dakota on a dairy farm back in the 50's and 60's. Becoming a teenager just as the *"you meet the nicest people on a Honda"* advertisement slogan was getting underway. After a short ride as a passenger, at the age of 12, on the pillion of an Allstate Cushman Scooter, I decided pedaling was not for me anymore. Working jobs for neighboring farmers, I finally saved up enough money to afford my first of many motorcycles, a 1965 Honda S65. Finishing High School in 1969, I left the farm for the Denver area to study Automotive and Diesel mechanics, a career that only lasted a couple of years as it was not as much fun as expected but provided a knowledgeable background on combustion engines that is helpful in my current retirement hobby of collecting, restoring and showing vintage Japanese motorcycles.

Always keeping a bike in the garage and taking many cross country road trips with my wife, I finally sold what he thought would be my last bike in 1976 when I needed to focus on raising 4 daughters. Then when having an empty nest in 2005 I bought a Honda CL175 on eBay with a surprisingly low bid, and after 28 years without ownership the addiction really took hold again. Retiring at the end of 2011 I now only work on motorcycles from my own collection, which has grown to over 100 different Japanese models from the '60's to the mid 70's, I still enjoy riding the back roads around my home about 35 miles outside of the Denver.





I try to spend a couple hours each day in my shop working on bikes, rebuilding engines or working on electrical problems as well as just general bike maintenance. Fall and spring time is usually spent doing some type of restoration. During the coldest part of Winter I will often spend time researching different models and looking for parts to purchase for rebuilding a bike.

I enjoy giving my Grandchildren rides when they come out to visit, also teaching the older ones how to ride. That can sometimes get exciting!
